

GoodLuck releases new single - Q&A with Juliet Harding



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Electro-pop band GoodLuck have released a new single Rum & Cola on their own label Get Lucky Records.

I caught up with the fantastic Juliet Harding who does vocals, production and songwriting for the award-winning GoodLuck, a chart-topping live electronic band from Cape Town.

The GoodLuck sound fits nicely between the worlds of electronic-pop and accessible dance music. As far as songwriting is concerned, Harding mentioned: "We all come up with a song concept, and then I'll write about the feeling that is inspiring in me. It's very collaborative."
